



Donors Rally Around Hoag

The coronavirus crisis has changed a lot about our everyday lives. One thing that hasn't changed — Hoag is there for the community, and our generous donors are there for Hoag.

When the pandemic began, numerous members of the community asked how they could support Hoag's efforts in the fight. Hoag Hospital Foundation established the Hoag COVID-19 Support Fund, which was met with an overwhelming response from corporate and private donors alike. Significant gifts from Kingston Technology, Activision Blizzard and Hoag donor Richard Scudamore kicked off the Hoag COVID-19 fundraising efforts. Together with more than 200 gifts from generous community members, such as Julia and George Argyros, Joan and Andy Fimiano, and Ron and Sandi Simon, Hoag COVID-19 fundraising proceeds exceed \$6 million to date.

The Hoag COVID-19 Support Fund has helped Hoag remain nimble and act swiftly in light of the developing situation. The Fund supports areas of greatest need, including assisting Hoag in providing additional equipment to protect Hoag staff and patients.

Meeting Every Need

Local businesses and individuals are finding other ways to give as well. Many have donated items, such as personal protective equipment.

Mary and Dick Allen and Diane and Michael Stephens made cash gifts allowing patients living with type 1 diabetes and experiencing financial hardship to receive free insulin upon being discharged from Hoag and from Mary & Dick Allen Diabetes Center. These patients require multiple injections of short-acting and long-acting insulin every day to stay alive. The cost of insulin can become staggering in the event of unemployment or job loss.

"We know that needs will grow and evolve as the pandemic continues to unfold," said Hoag President and CEO Robert Braithwaite. "We offer our heart-felt thanks to all of our generous donors for standing by us as we work on behalf of our community. What they may not know is that donor support is a great morale boost to our staff as well as providing tangible resources."

Hoag nurse Cecy O'Berg, BSN, RN, PHN, PCCN, is a testament to this. "Because of our donors, we never have to worry about our supplies of PPE. There is never a question," said Cecy. "Knowing the community is behind us really allows us to focus on delivering the best care for our patients."

Donor Support Positions Hoag to Conduct COVID-19 Testing and Research

Thanks to the support of our donors, Hoag's Center for Research and Education (HCRE) has emerged as a leader in clinical research. As a result, Hoag is on a short and elite list of health care systems with the infrastructure in place to conduct clinical trials of various drugs and other interventions for COVID-19:

- Hoag was one of the top trial sites for the Gilead antiviral drug remdesivir. Our findings contributed to the FDA's rapid approval for emergency use.
- Hoag is currently participating in the Mayo Clinic convalescent plasma trial and community-focused testing trials.
- Hoag has launched an antibody testing trial focused on our own health care workers to increase understanding of COVID-19 immunity.
- HCRE is in the pre-clinical stage with a local drug company of deploying a COVID-19 vaccine.

As Medical Director of Infection Prevention and Hospital Epidemiology at Hoag, Philip Robinson, MD, FIDSA, is leading the COVID-19 response for Hoag. "I and our entire Hoag team are very grateful to our community for supporting us as we conduct our response, including critical testing and research," said Dr. Robinson.

"Past and present donor support has positioned Hoag to contribute in a major way to the regional and nationwide efforts to mitigate COVID-19."

A Special Gift from the Committee of 100

Hoag was one of 30 U.S. hospitals gifted with personal protective equipment from the Committee of 100, a nonprofit U.S. leadership organization of prominent Chinese Americans. Hoag leaders were grateful to receive 490 isolation gowns and 1,200 masks from the revered group.

As Hoag staff work tirelessly for our community, they are cognizant of and very grateful for the

outpouring of support. "Your public commitment to donate personal protective equipment to 30 hospitals is remarkable. We are deeply grateful that Hoag, and our community, will benefit from your generosity," said Hoag President and CEO Robert Braithwaite. "Your giving uplifts and inspires our staff as much as the gowns you donated will shield and protect them."

The concept of founding the Committee came from the late, renowned architect I.M. Pei and Dr. Henry Kissinger, 56th U.S. Secretary of State, in 1988. In 1989, Pei teamed with master cellist Yo-Yo Ma, Henry S. Tang, Oscar Tang, Shirley Young and Chien-Shiung Wu to recruit distinguished Chinese Americans from the arts, business, academia, public service and sciences to serve on the Committee of 100.



Campaign Update

The Home Stretch


We are in the home stretch of the Hoag Promise Campaign, and our fundraising is still going strong. As we roll toward the Campaign end date of December 31, 2020, we've raised \$705 million to date, surpassing our \$627 million goal.

Despite reaching the overall goal, we still have some work to do to meet and exceed our clinical fundraising priorities within the larger Campaign. Here's a snapshot of what we've raised for each of our Campaign sub-goals:



HOAG FAMILY CANCER INSTITUTE

Clinical Research Provides Breakthrough Cancer Care Close to Home



More than 80 percent of cancer patients receive care in the community setting, yet treatments based on real-time scientific advances are typically available to patients only at large academic medical centers. For most patients, this kind of care is far from home and difficult to access.

Hoag Family Cancer Institute (HFCI) envisioned something better for our community – an expansive offering of clinical trials that provide Hoag patients access to the very latest in cancer care, all delivered with Hoag's personal and compassionate style. With the most innovative breakthrough treatments available locally, HFCI is the best of both worlds. In the last five years, Hoag Family Cancer Institute has built an extensive cancer clinical research program with over 80 clinical trials currently open.

One of its hallmarks is the Developmental Therapeutics Program — a portfolio of early phase clinical trials (phase I and II) that bring what is new and still evolving in scientific laboratories to the clinical setting. For many patients, especially those with advanced cancer, a novel approach being tested through a clinical trial could offer new hope. Hoag is the first and only community hospital in Orange County to offer early phase trials.

In total, since the Developmental Therapeutics Program began, over 80 phase I and II clinical trials have opened.

In many cases, Hoag is one of a small number of centers in the country where patients can access these emerging treatments. Some clinical trials at Hoag include the most promising applications in immunotherapy — therapies that ignite the patient's immune system to fight cancer – as well as targeted or precision treatments, which apply drugs that target the unique genetic changes driving an individual's cancer. Some of the most innovative cancer research is combining multiple drugs and therapies.

Cancer research is accelerating at an increasingly rapid pace. As new discoveries are translated from the bench to the bedside through clinical trials, Hoag Family Cancer Institute's foresight in building this unique program gives cancer patients in our community every treatment advantage.

Bringing the Best to Hoag

Hoag Family Cancer Institute
Recruits Distinguished Expert in
Molecular Imaging and Therapeutics



Gary A. Ulaner, MD, PhD, FACNM, joins Hoag Family Cancer Institute from Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, where he served as the PET/CT expert on the Breast

Cancer Disease Management Team. His background includes education and training at Stanford, Johns Hopkins and USC, dual board certifications in radiology and nuclear medicine and numerous publications in top-rated medical journals.

A physician-scientist, Dr. Ulaner develops molecular imaging agents that target individual cancers. These agents help determine which therapies a patient will best respond to and allow radiotherapy to be directed at individual cancer cells. He is the principal investigator on many important clinical trials in cancer imaging and radiotherapy, including several that are funded by the National Institutes of Health. These trials will continue at Hoag under Dr. Ulaner's leadership.

"There have been tremendous recent advances in cancer therapies which 'target' a specific molecule on the cancer cell. Cancer imaging is now catching up with these advances, and I am so happy to help bring them to the Hoag community," Dr. Ulaner says. "I look forward to working with the team to build a Molecular Imaging and Therapy (MIT) program that can assist patients with many types of cancer."

Hoag's Groundbreaking Clinical Trials

Change the Course of Pancreatic Cancer Treatment


Pancreatic cancer is often said to be the most lethal of all cancers. With good reason – fewer than 20 percent of those diagnosed live longer than one year. Thanks to donor support, groundbreaking clinical research could change that.

With support from the Seena Magowitz Foundation, Hoag Family Cancer Institute will soon offer a phase 1 clinical trial testing an innovative treatment approach for patients with metastatic, or advanced, pancreatic cancer. The trial combines two immunotherapy drugs that alert the patient's immune system of the invader, then mobilize it to attack. The combination of the two drugs is already a novel approach. The trial takes it a step further by injecting the therapy directly into the patient's tumors using state-of-the-art CT image guidance. Researchers hypothesize that unleashing the therapy in this targeted way will trigger a system-wide message to the immune system to also attack the cancer that has spread to other parts of the body.

Because most pancreatic cancer cases are diagnosed at the advanced stage after it has already spread, treatment options are limited. This new approach could be a game-changer and may have implications for other types of cancer that has spread. The trial, which opened at Hoag in the summer of 2020, will only be available at three sites in the country.



The ability to open a clinical trial with this level of complexity requires specific expertise and a robust clinical research infrastructure. Philanthropic partners like the Seena Magowitz Foundation help make both possible, giving patients in our community access to some of the most promising advances in cancer treatment.

Catalyzing Innovation

Striving for innovation is a high priority at Hoag, a goal which requires assistance from those who are equally committed to the progress. Hoag Innovators, a group of like-minded philanthropists, advance this goal by investing in health care innovation at Hoag.

Founded and led by Kitty and Robert Brunswick, former Hoag Hospital Foundation Board Chair, Hoag Innovators is a dedicated group of philanthropists, entrepreneurs and community leaders leveraging the power of collective giving. technologies and implementing innovative programs and services for our vibrant community.

Hoag Innovators gather biannually to learn more about the latest advancements in medicine from Hoag's leading physicians and to consider how to allocate their pooled philanthropic gifts most advantageously. The Hoag Innovators 2020 Spring Meeting confirmed the group is making an impact by catalyzing innovation and advancement at Hoag.

Forward-Thinking Philanthropy

Hoag Innovators fund a variety of vital programs at Hoag. To date, the group has raised \$1,075,000 and distributed those funds to the following programs:

- KODEX-EPD 3D Cardiac Mapping —
 Provides real-time, high-definition images during procedures with unmatched clarity for more precise and personalized arrhythmia treatment.
- Pacify Application Pilot —
 Virtual, 24/7 on-demand access to postpartum resources, including lactation consultants, midwives, nutritionists and social workers.
- Invenio NIO Laser Imaging —
 Provides high-quality images in a fraction of the time of traditional methods to allow surgeons to make rapid diagnosis and treatment.
- Klue App Pilot in Gestational Diabetes —
 Uses artificial intelligence to monitor when user is eating or drinking and support healthy choices.

- Leaf Device Implementation in Critical Care Units — Monitoring system to detect movement and prevent pressure injuries to critical care patients.
- Transitional Care Pilot Program —
 Post-discharge home health care and resource coordination to prevent ER visits and hospital readmissions.
- Related Conditions Program —
 Recruited renowned physician to lead expert team for patients with rare diseases (only program of its kind in a community hospital in the US).

To help those affected by COVID-19, Hoag Innovators will provide support to Hoag's team of trained infection prevention experts who work on developing leading-edge treatments and robust testing capabilities. Celebrating 33 Years of Dedication and Care by Circle 1000

It all started in 1987 when breast cancer survivor and Newport Beach resident Sandy Sewell founded Circle 1000 to support Hoag Family Cancer Institute. Sandy gathered a group of friends to join her mission. She asked them to contribute \$1,000 and to invite their own circle of friends to participate. The generosity spread. In its 33-year history, Circle 1000 has raised more than \$20 million thanks to the support of over 1,000 members.

Each year, Circle 1000 donors gather at a brunch event to celebrate their shared commitment to supporting advanced cancer care at Hoag. Due to COVID-19, the 33rd Annual Circle 1000 Founders' Celebration Brunch could not take place as scheduled this spring.

Commitment to Serve

Former Hoag President and CEO
Dr. Rick Afable and his wife, Sally,
make a gift to support Hoag's efforts
to provide care coordination and
advocacy for patients

When Rick Afable, MD, learned about Hoag's Care Coordinator and Patient Advocacy Program during a Hoag Promise Campaign Steering Committee meeting, he couldn't wait to tell his wife, Sally, about it. A physician, experienced health care administrator and former President and CEO of Hoag, Dr. Afable understands the complexities and challenges patients often face in navigating the medical system better than most. "The notion of care coordination and advocacy was and is sorely missing in health care," says Dr. Afable. "For a community organization like Hoag to take the step of providing this, knowing that insurance doesn't pay for it and knowing that it's needed but not expected, really resonated with me."

Sally, who has spent much of her life working with the elderly, readily agreed. "I would listen to their frustrations and their family's frustrations in coordinating all of their health care needs. Individuals can be so fragile when they are ill and trying to care for themselves and the ones they love. It's easy for them to get swallowed up by the system."

The Afables were so inspired by Hoag's efforts to do more for patients that they decided to make a generous estate gift in support of Hoag's Care Coordinator and Patient Advocacy Program.

Easing the Patient's Burden

With the opening of Hoag Health Center Irvine – Sand Canyon in 2016, Hoag piloted the Care Coordinator and Patient Advocacy Program. The intention was to dramatically improve the patient experience by providing coordination, navigation and advocacy services. Hoag's care coordinators schedule and coordinate appointments, act as an advocate and personal liaison for patients, assist with insurance authorizations, provide care itineraries, help remove




barriers to care, educate patients about the insurance process and community resources and make navigating the health care system more manageable.

The pilot was so successful, it has grown into four full-time Care Coordinator positions, which have assisted over 7,000 patients to date at Hoag Health Center Irvine, Hoag Health Center Tustin Legacy and Hoag Health Center Foothill Ranch. The Afables look forward to seeing even more patients benefit. Hoag's vision is to implement 10 Care Coordinators throughout Hoag's network of health care centers.

For the Care of Others

The Afable's passion for the program stems from a deep-rooted commitment to serving and caring for others. It has been the driving force behind everything they do. As President and CEO of Hoag from 2005-2013, Dr. Afable helped shape Hoag into the world-class organization it is today: one that serves the community by providing care that is second to none. Today, he leads Be Well OC, a public/private partnership designed to vastly improve the health and well-being of those suffering from mental health and substance abuse issues in Orange County. Sally volunteers her time to teach Bible studies and help women through drug and alcohol recovery.

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
